GEOGRAPHICAL POSITION

- Luhansk region is located in the east of Ukraine.
- The total length of the border with Russia within the Luhansk region is 737 km (39% of the total length of the Ukrainian-Russian border), which is the longest in Ukraine.
- Luhansk region shares its entire border with Russia, without any borders with other countries.
- This geographical arrangement imposes limitations and excludes direct contacts with neighboring nations.

As of January 01, 2020 natural gas reserves amounted to **12663 million m³**.







DESTRUCTIONS

In 2014, the enemy captured and destroyed the industrial south, and in 2022, the agrarian north of the region.

Currently, 99% of the territory of the region is temporarily occupied. Ongoing hostilities on the territory of Luhansk region, temporary occupation of a large part of Luhansk region pose significant challenges for the region and Ukraine as a whole in humanitarian, economic, social, ecological, and security dimensions.



NETWORK OF HUMANITIES HUBS



Extensive support network

36 centres in **20 regions** of Ukraine provide assistance to over **110,000 IDPs** from Luhansk region.

Services are provided by **201 IDP specialists** (170 of whom are social workers) from relocated institutions.



Humanitarian aid

Since the hubs began operating, ~10 600 tonnes of humanitarian aid have been distributed to residents of Luhansk.



*A wide range of services

Services are provided regardless of the place of registration of IDPs.





Medical assistance:

Appointments with family doctors.



Legal support:

Restoration of documents, drafting of procedural documents.



Social protection:

Consultations on social security issues, support for veterans and their families, pensions, assisted living services, household services, children's health improvement.

- 22 Administrative Service Centres provide administrative services (e.g. damage registration, military data updates, residence certificates).
- The **digital hub 'My Luhansk Region'** in Dnipro offers training in digital literacy and working with 'Diia'.

Despite challenges, the university continues to operate with a dedicated staff and student body, maintaining the spirit of Shevchenko and faith in Ukraine's future. It has quickly adapted to remote work and identified five key areas of activity: defense, organizational management, education, international relations, and information security.



STATE ESTABLISHMENT "LUHANSK STATE MEDICAL UNIVERSITY"

The University trains both domestic and foreign students, providing training for Masters' Degree in Medicine, Dentistry, Pediatrics, Pharmacy, Medical Psychology and Public Management and Administration in healthcare under accredited programs and specialties.



LUGANIAN REGIONAL INSTITUTE POST-GRADUATE TEACHER EDUCATION



Provides scientific, methodological and organisational support for the professional development of pedagogical staff, providing social, pedagogical and psychological assistance to participants in the educational process, improving their competence, the quality of inclusive education and the overall quality of education under martial law.

CONCERT ACTIVITIES

Touring Ukraine and participating in national and international festivals maintains contact with audiences and represents Ukrainian art.



INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

Developing partnerships with Sweden, France, Poland, and Switzerland through exchanges of conductors and joint projects integrates Ukrainian culture into the world.



CONCERTS FOR THE FRONT/REAR

During this time, we have concluded 20 memorandums with international partners.

ATTRACTING FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Over one million US dollars of funds raised as part of international technical assistance projects.

SUPPORT FOR IDPS AND COMMUNITIES

23 projects aimed at supporting internally displaced persons from the Luhansk region have been implemented. These include the creation of shelters, the provision of humanitarian aid and psychological support, as well as assistance in helping IDPs adapt to their new surroundings.

ESTABLISHMENT OF THE REGIONAL OFFICE FOR INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

The office was established under the Regional State Administration. Its purpose is to develop international relations, establish contacts with foreign partners, coordinate efforts to rebuild the region and support internally displaced persons. This ensures a systematic approach to international partnership.
